The saying is, "On Cinco de Mayo, everybody's Latino!" For more than two decades, the Maru Montero Dance Company has hosted an annual May 5 festival to commemorate Mexico's victory in the 1862 Battle of Puebla during the Franco-Mexican War. The free day-long celebration on the Mall, featuring music, dance and crafts, is "a chance to make a party, and it's a family party," says Maru Montero, the dance company and festival founder. She calls it 100 percent cultural and open to Washington's diverse array of Latin Americans. "After the winter, this is perfect," Montero says.

- Costume changes for the Maru Montero Dance Company.
 These include men in mariachi suits with silver buttons and
 wide-brimmed hats who change into white cotton pants
 and loose guayabera shirts. The women change from
 ranchera long skirts with colorful ribbons into long white Veracruz dresses with black aprons.
- Types of music and dances performed, including mariachi, hip-hop, banda, salsa, cumbia, merengue and folk.
- Latin American countries represented. Performers hail from Mexico, where the holiday originated, as well as Brazil, Peru, El Salvador, Guatemala, Panama, Bolivia and
- Years since the festival began with a handful of school celebrations. After performances at community centers and the Kennedy Center, the festival moved to the Mall in 1998 and has grown to include nearly 20,000 people.
- Maru Montero began her Columbia Heights-based company to promote Mexican and Latin American dance. It includes children's programs, community outreach and professional dancers. Members perform at schools, libraries and festivals, and annually at agencies during Hispanic Heritage month, which begins Sept. 15.
- Years since the Cinco de Mayo battle in which outgunned Mexican troops prevailed against occupying French forces. The victory was a tremendous source of pride and helped slow French troops en route to Mexico City.

Maru Montero

Montero is the founder of Maru Montero Dance Company, which is organizing a free Cinco de Mayo Festival on Sunday from noon to 6 p.m. On



from noon to 6 p.m. On the National Mall between Eighth and 12th streets near the Smithsonian Metro station, the event is being billed as "Latin America's Family Reunion," with music, dancing, pinatas and art exhibits.

What's happening? Every year it's a free event for the whole family. Arts and crafts for the whole family. We have Eileen Torres with the salsa dancers. When they finish, the next band is ready, and boom — the band is playing. We stop, we teach the crowd a little bit about what salsa is all about. It's constantly like that, and we have five bands. We always try to do collaborations with the musicians and the other dance companies, as well. We represent as many cultures as we can. It's 100 percent cultural. It's not commercial. That's one of the things we're proud about.

What cultures will be represented? We try to represent the Aztecs, and we have some people coming from Guatemala and representing the Mayans. There's a lot of fusion. It makes it more interesting.

What's there to eat? There's going to be Mexican food, and there're also stands from the National Park Service. Everyone is welcome to bring their own picnic.

What can people do there? We'll have dance contests. It could be formal, it could be informal. It depends what kind of crowd we have. Sometimes we have gift cards for Target. We give out hats because the hats are popular.

How many people will be there? Last year [1] think that we had 15,000.

Swaying to Hispanic beat on the Mal

Cinco de Mayo celebrants enjoy cultural music, food

aru Montero left for the United States from her home in Oaxaca, Mexico, with just one pair of dance shoes.

It was a sacrifice for the lead lancer of the famed Ballet Folklopico de Mexico.


But, decades later, she has her own dance company and she directs the National Cinco de Mayo Festival, which marked its 21st annual celebration of Hispanic culture on the Mall on Sunday.

"It was a need that made us into who we are," said Ms. Montero, as she paused for a few quiet moments before drums and flutes called the dancers to the stage.

Twenty years ago, Ms. Montero's Columbia Heights-based dance company would get a few requests from area schools to come dance, but that quickly grew into a full-fledged festival.

On Sunday, the celebration sprawled between two large white tents set up near the Smithsonian Castle. The loud beat of drums beckoned curious passers-by to the dancing stage, while a long line of hungry patrons waited beneath wafting smoke

Christine MacDonald, managing director of Hola Cultura, said she was not surprised at the turnout.

The U.S. Census Bureau shows that the District's Hispanic-origin population increased by more than 15,000 between 2000 and 2012 to about 60,000.

"There is a big [Hispanic] community here," Ms. MacDonald said. "You have kids who grow up here, the community prospers and those kids have children they want to introduce to their culture."

As he waited for his three children to take the stage, 44-year-old Celerino

Cruz said this year's festival was the first time he and his family attended.

"We were excited about this year," said Mr. Cruz, who emigrated to the area from Mexico 17 years ago. "My children just started dancing. We wanted to show our kids their heritage."

Watching her 5-year-old son Daniel kicking a soccer ball on the outskirts of the crowd, 49-year-old Jackie Walker said her family makes the trip down to the Mall each year for the festival, but this year stood out because "there were so many strides this year in terms of immigration issues and licensing.


"It's a good time for celebration in the community," she said.



A local dance company is hosting its annual Cinco de Mayo festival on the mall, hoping to educate and entertain people with Latino cultures and traditions.

The Maru Montero Dance Company has hosted the festival since 1992, starting out in community centers and schools around the region. The festival now takes place on the National Mall, where thousands are expected to gather to experience traditional Mexican food and dance.

Maru Montero, the company's owner, said the festival was designed to be a family-friendly event that featured music and dance to celebrate and educate attendees on Latino culture. Last year, about 15,000 people attended and she expects about the same to come this year.

"There are not many festivals like this," she said. "We make [people] feel accepted and make them proud of who

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Popular in Local

The main stage at the event will feature live performances by members of the Maru Montero Dance Company and will include live music. Attendees will also be able to taste some authentic Latin American cuisine and purchase Mexican food at a mercado.

There will also be a space for children to do traditional arts and crafts focusing on Latino culture.

Historically, Cinco de Mayo is a holiday to signify and commemorate the Mexican Army's victory over French forces at the Battle of Puebla in 1862. Though the holiday is inherently important to Mexicans, Montero — who is a native of Mexico — said she believes it should be a chance to celebrate all Latino culture.

To put on the festival, the company received donations and grants from various community groups and organizations. The D.C. Commission of the Arts and Humanities provided a grant to the festival and has been a frequent supporter of the dance company.

"Because of the diverse and international artistic experiences here in the District of Columbia, this city has become one of the cultural capitals of the world," said Lionell Thomas, executive director of the commission.

Other supporters include the D.C. Mayor's Office of Latino Affairs, who gave the company a grant to help educate others on Latino culture.

"The event is a great platform for children and others involved in these programs to show off their dance and to show off their pride in their culture," said Josue Salmaron, grants program manager with the Office of Latino Affairs. "They're bringing the cultural awareness piece to it."

Montero said she hopes the festival, which kicks off at noon, will draw people in from all walks of life to enjoy the music and to learn something new about Latino culture.

"It's about having a great time and relaxing with your families," she said. "And learn as much as you can everything is culturally relevant."
